
In order for bridges to be built, a person has to acknowledge wrongdoing, so as to be reconciled to others and to God.

What is so important about building bridges?

Big Question: What's so important about building bridges?

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Confession		An act of owning up to your wrongdoings whether they are to yourself or to others.
Penance		Penance is a way of saying sorry to God. We confess our sins and try to make amends. We then try to make things right by doing good and becoming closer to God.
Absolution		The act of forgiving someone when they have done something wrong.
Contrition		We say the Act of Contrition at the beginning of Reconciliation to say sorry to God.

The Sacrament of **Reconciliation** (Confession)

During this **Sacrament**, Christians confess their **sins** to a priest to say sorry to God who will forgive them.

Before taking part Christians examine their consciences to decide what to confess. The priest will never reveal their confessed sins to anyone. Afterwards, the priest will give them a **Penance** to say sorry which might be some prayers to say or acts to do.


<u>a Prayer</u> (*Deuteronomy 6: 4-9*)

God gave his people a <u>special reminder</u> of their responsibility to love God. It is a prayer called **the Shema**. Jewish people recite this twice a day.

The Greatest Commandment (Mark 12: 28-31)

Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength'.

The second most important commandment is this: 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself'.



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
