Phonics and Phonics Homework

- Phonics helps children learn how to read and write.
- Each letter/grapheme makes a sound and has a name. (cat)
- Words can be sounded-out to help children read and write them.
- Sounding out for reading (blending).
- Sounding out for writing (segmenting).
- Flash cards at home to help your children remember the sounds.
- Sheets sent home with a phrase to help your child remember the movements needed to write the letter.
- Videos on the Little Wandle Website with sound pronunciations.



Red and Green Words

- Children need to practise reading words.
- Word cards sent home on two different colours (red and green).
- Green words can be soundedout.
- Red words are more difficult to sound-out so we tell the children to just read them automatically . (E.g is, the, he)



Reading in EYFS

- •In the next few weeks, your child will get their first reading book!
- Wordless books -----> Phonic levelled book.
- 3 Guided Reading Sessions.
- •Please read every day this only needs to be 2-3 pages.
- •Every time you read, please record this in your child's reading diary.
- •90% independence in reading.
- Rainbow Readers!









Reading Books

- 1 phonic reading book each week which is matched at an appropriate level for your child.
- 1 library book to read to your child changed every **Tuesday**.
- Reading books will be changed on a <u>Wednesday</u>.
- Always talk about the story and make it enjoyable.
 Praise your child for their efforts:)
- Please keep your child's reading book and diary in the plastic wallets at all times.
- Please bring your bookbag into school every day.





Vocabulary.

- Learning new language and vocabulary
- When reading books, it is important to focus on using English, or if necessary, your home language alongside English, while language skills are developing
- Point out new words and their meanings.



Parental involvement and Support.

- Parental support documents sent out via Arbor.
- Video of each week's phonics sounds, red words and oral segmenting and blending examples sent out via Arbor for you to watch every week.
- Example video of reading 1:1 with a child to support with home reading.
- Parental invitation: Carol Concert. Eastertide Decoration Afternoon, Family Bring a Book Afternoon.



Here are a few ideas of activities you can do at home that are fun, engaging and will also help to strengthen your little one's arms, hands and fingers. This will then help them become confident, skilful and controlled writers

1. Threading pasta into straws/sticks or onto shoelaces.



2. Playdough - rolling, cutting, snipping splatting, squeezing and pulling really helps to develop children's hand and



3. Mark making/colouring - with crayons, chalk, pens or felt tips.




4. Using equipment such as scissors to cut, tweezers to grab pom poms or pegs on a bucket or washing line.





Here is a typical guide on how children's pencil grip tends to develop. Please do not worry too much if your child is not using a tripod grip with confidence yet, every child will develop at their own pace. You can use the fine motor activities document to help your child to strengthen their hands which will then help them to being using the tripod grip. Lots of practise also will help, with gentle corrections if they are holding their pen incorrectly. Please do speak to your class teacher if you have any other questions about pencil grip and early





Library Books


- Library visits every Tuesday

- Maths resources Number Pockets.
- A continuation and consolidation of the week's lessons
- Number study approach
- Getting to know everything possible about a number to ensure firm number knowledge.

- All Reception classes will have PE on a Friday.

To support Fine Motor at home:

Cutting using scissors, playing with playdoh, threading with string and beads, painting, building with lego.

- In-class reward systems which could include: House points, class star chart, Golden Time.
